Panel Convenor	<p><b>Prof Kumaralingam Amirthalingam</b></p> <p>Kumaralingam Amirthalingam obtained his LLB (Hons) and PhD in law from the Australian National University where he commenced his academic career. He joined the Faculty of Law, National University of Singapore in 2000 and over the years has served as Vice Dean (Academic Affairs), Vice Dean (International Programmes) and Director, Asian Law Institute. He has served on various University committees, and was Chair of the NUS Teaching Academy from 2015 to 2018. Beyond NUS, he is an Adjunct Professor at the Law Faculty, Australian National University; Teaching Faculty of the Singapore Medical Association Centre for Medical Ethics and Professionalism; and External Examiner for the Faculty of Law, University Teknologi MARA (Malaysia). From 2012 to 2014, he was on secondment to the Attorney-General's Chambers, Singapore as a Deputy Public Prosecutor and Senior Director (Research &amp; Policy). His research is primarily in the areas of criminal law and justice (focusing on the role of the Public Prosecutor) and tort law (focusing on medical liability and economic loss).</p>

She began her academic career in 2001 at FDUC and currently she holds a dual position, as Assistant Professor at FDUC and Assistant Professor at the Faculty of Law of the University of Macau. In the past she was of-counsel at Vieira de Almeida e Associados law office, in Portugal, in the area of health law. She is associated researcher at the Centre for Human Rights - Ius Gentium and at the Center for Biomedical Law, both from FDUC. She authored several studies in Portuguese, English and Spanish (some translated into Chinese), in particular on health and medical law, criminal law and human rights, she is a member of several institutes and scientific associations dedicated to this area of studies and she is also a frequent speaker in events related with these topics.</p> <p><b>Dr Calvin WL Ho</b></p> <p>Calvin Ho is Assistant Professor at the NUS Centre for Biomedical Ethics, Co-Head of the WHO Collaborating Centre for Bioethics in Singapore, and Co-Head of the Accountability Policy Task Team of the Global Alliance for Genomics &amp; Health. Additionally, he serves as an Assistant Director with the Legal Aid Bureau of the Ministry of Law (Singapore), as well as on the Singapore Nursing Board and advisory committees for transplantation and for genetic testing of the Ministry of Health (Singapore). He has published on biomedical law and ethics, health policy and systems, and global health, and is the co-editor of Bioethics in Singapore: An Ethical Microcosm (2010, World Scientific) and Genetic Privacy (2013, Imperial College Press), the author of Juridification in Bioethics: Governance of Human Pluripotent Cell Research (2016, Imperial College Press), as well as an author of the WHO Guidelines on Ethical Issues in Public Health Surveillance (2017).</p>
