Janet is also engaged in research and development in the emerging field of commercial cross-border mediation and online dispute resolution. Name of Panellists	<p>Asst Prof Eunice Chua</p> <p>Eunice is an Assistant Professor at the Singapore Management University (“SMU”) School of Law teaching Legal Research and Writing. She is also qualified as an Advocate and Solicitor in Singapore and an Associate Mediator of the Singapore Mediation Centre (SMC).</p> <p>After graduating with a First Class Honours law degree from the National University of Singapore, Eunice served as a Justices’ Law Clerk in the Singapore Supreme Court. She subsequently obtained a Masters of Law from Harvard. On her return, she was appointed an Assistant Registrar of the Singapore Supreme Court, a Magistrate of the Singapore State Courts and Assistant Director of the SMC. In 2014, she became the first Deputy Chief Executive Officer of the Singapore International Mediation Centre. Eunice has conducted mediation training and spoken about mediation at various local and international fora. Apart from mediation, she is also interested in evidence and civil and criminal procedure. She has co-authored a monograph on Singapore Civil Procedure as well as published book chapters and articles in various academic journals.</p> <p>Assoc Prof Lum Kit-Wye</p> <p>Lum Kit-Wye is Associate Dean (Undergraduate Student Life) at the Nanyang Business School, Nanyang Technological University. She was in private practice at a local law firm before joining the Nanyang Business School in 1994 where she has taught business law, negotiation and dispute resolution to both the undergraduates and the participants of the Nanyang MBA.</p> <p>In 2002, she won NTU’s Teacher of the Year Award for the Nanyang Business School. She also won the Nanyang Business School Award for Teacher of the Division in 2002. In 2012, she won the Nanyang Business School Divisional Teaching Excellence Award. In 2015, she was given the Outstanding Volunteer Award in recognition of her contribution as a volunteer mediator at the Singapore State Courts.</p> <p>She is an experienced trainer and has conducted many negotiation and conflict resolution workshops for judiciaries, government agencies and private organisations in Singapore, Brunei, the Philippines, Cambodia, Fiji, India, Sri Lanka and Thailand. She is the author of Principles of Law for Engineers, a text aimed at laws particularly relevant to engineers, as well as co-author of Contract Law. She was also a contributor to the Halsbury Laws of Singapore (2009). She</p>

is a Principal Mediator with the Singapore Mediation Centre, an accredited mediator on the Panel of Mediators with the State Courts Centre for Dispute Resolution, a SIMI Certified Mediator and an IMI Certified Mediator. She researches mainly in the areas of contract law, tort law and dispute resolution.

Mark Walter is an lawyer specializing in the business-enabling environment, commercial dispute resolution, trade policy reform and assessment, and drafting and implementation of commercial law. Prior to joining DAI, Mark was Singapore Director for the U.S.-Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) Technical Assistance to Advance Regional Integration Project, leading legal and regulatory reform work across the region, and to help develop policy priorities for upcoming APEC hosts, Papua New Guinea, Chile, and Malaysia. Prior to joining the APEC program, Mark was Managing Director for Nathan Associates' Legal and Regulatory Practice in Washington, D.C., where he directed U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) reform programs. Previously, Mark was Chief of Party on the USAID-funded Doha Project for World Trade Organization Accession in Ethiopia, and on its redesigned successor project, the Ethiopia WTO Accession Plus Program from 2006 and 2008. From 2008 to 2011, he led the business-enabling environment component of a USAID private sector development program in Kosovo. He has also served as Assistant Director for the Center for International Legal Education at the University of Pittsburgh, Adjunct Professor of Law, and as guest professor at universities in Eastern and Southeastern Europe. He has worked with trade law reform, lectured, and developed commercial law and legal education reform programs in more than 20 countries across Africa, Asia, and Europe.
